




OUR MISSION

Church Farm School (CFS) is an independent boarding and day school for boys in grades 9–12 in the Episcopal tradition. Founded in 1918 and located in Exton, PA, Church Farm School prepares dynamic young men to become tomorrow's changemakers through a transformative education rooted in curiosity, leadership development, engaged citizenship and the pursuit of excellence alongside one's brothers. CFS is accredited by the Middle States Association and is a member of both the National Association of Episcopal Schools and the National Association of Independent Schools.

SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

CFS has an enrollment of 146 students in grades 9 through 12, with a group of 38 seniors expected to graduate in May 2026. We are committed to diversity at CFS, and minority students make up approximately 95% of the student body. Most of our students receive financial aid, in keeping with our goal of making a private, college-preparatory education uniquely affordable. Less than 5% of our operating budget is from tuition revenue.

The overwhelming majority of CFS graduates go on to four-year colleges and universities for further study. There are 26 full and part-time members of the teaching faculty, most of whom hold advanced degrees. Our current student-faculty ratio is 6:1.

CURRICULUM AND ACADEMICS:

All courses meet for 65-minute periods, three times a week. Our goal is to allow time for more intensive and project-based classwork and introduce students to a schedule similar to what they will experience in college. Most students take six courses each semester - some choose to take seven, and seniors who take an intensely rigorous courseload and/or are honor roll students may apply to take five.

Minimum graduation requirements at CFS include 22 credits, distributed as follows: English (4), mathematics (3), social studies (4), laboratory science (3), modern language (2), visual and performing arts (1), world religions (0.5), health (0.5) and electives (4). Most students complete additional credits, especially in math, science and language.

Most CFS major courses are year-long (1 credit), while most electives meet for a single semester (.5 credit). Official grades are distributed four times per year. Honor Roll is achieved by earning a marking period average of 92 or above, with no grade below 83. The CFS National Honor Society chapter inducted 10 members last spring. We do not rank students.

*CFS phased out Advanced Placement (AP) courses during the 2022-2023 school year. Advanced Courses offer a broader experience, and incorporate college-level research, writing and discussion.

GRADING


CFS uses the following grade scale in all courses. All subjects count equally towards a student's GPA. There is no weighting for Advanced or Honors courses, so the maximum possible GPA is 4.0. Courses taken at any other school are not included in our GPA.

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

In addition to academics, CFS students are required to participate in athletics, community service activities, outdoor educational experiences and leadership development. For athletics, CFS is a member of the Bicentennial Athletic League (BAL) and the Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association (PIAA). We field competitive programs in soccer, cross-country, golf, basketball, wrestling, bowling, winter and spring track, tennis, lacrosse and baseball. Physical Education is through our required after-school sports program and is not recorded on the transcript.

All juniors participate in college planning seminars and SAT prep during the spring semester, and all seniors participate in a seminar series focused on the transition to college during their final semester. About 60 colleges visit CFS each year to meet our students.

ALUMNI SUCCESS PROGRAM

The national college graduation rate, especially for male students of color, is approximately 45%. We started the Alumni Success Program in 2016 to increase the percentage of Church Farm School students who graduate from a four-year college within six years. CFS staff contact students in college via text, email, phone and personal visits to assure alumni academic persistence and completion at the college level. CFS graduates are persisting and graduating at a rate of more than 85%.
